- Ernie King has agreed to chair a committee to oversee a Christmas ornament fundraiser for Columbus Hope.
- The State Convention was this weekend. Robb and Ernie attended. Ernie gave a short recap of the experience. He said that discussions about the increase in people attending church was mentioned and that we have an opportunity to recruit. Also, a new State deputy was elected at the convention.
- Fr. Williams from St. Thomas More received the McGivney award and spoke about campus ministries. He mentioned our council due to our help with serving at the Sunday Suppers. Quite a number of awards were won by the Transfiguration Council which was particularly attentive to making their service known. Robb mentioned that we are encouraged to have events and submit information about them to State so that we can compete for awards.

- By a vote of 95-0 the House passed a pregnancy resource tax credit bill, which is a dollar for dollar tax credit for donations to qualifying organizations.
- The Senate Medical Affairs committee recommended a total ban on abortion but it is too late to vote on it this year. Robb is hopeful that they will take up a House-passed bill to opt SC out of mail order and telemedicine prescribed abortion drugs. We are encouraged to contact our Senators about the bill.

FRATERNAL BENEFITS

Member/Spouse Accidental Death Benefit

The Knights of Columbus will pay a benefit upon the death of a member or his spouse, occurring within 90 days, as the result of injury sustained in a covered accident. Protection is on a 24-hour basis for accidents that may occur anywhere in the world during activities on or off the job, on business, pleasure, vacation, or at home, except for the exclusions. This benefit is given at no cost to all members (and their wives) residing in countries that have been designated as insurance territories by the Supreme Council.

Benefits

Years of Continuous Membership	Non-Insured Member Benefit	Insured Member* Benefit
Less than 5 years	\$1,500	\$3,000
5 years or more	\$2,500	\$5,000
Age 65+	\$1,500	\$1,500

The spouse benefit at all times corresponds to the member's benefit. Should the member predecease his wife, she shall continue to be covered thereafter at a fixed benefit of \$1,500. Should the spouse and the member die within 90 days from the same accident, however, the scheduled benefit will be paid.

Beneficiaries

The accidental death benefit will be paid to the next of kin in accordance with Section 71.2 of the Order's laws. The claim for this accidental death benefit must be received at the Supreme Office of the Knights of Columbus within three years of the date of death.

Exclusions

This accidental death benefit will not be paid if death results from: suicide, self-inflicted injury while sane or insane; sickness or disease (except bacterial infection resulting from accidental cut or wound); flying, except as a fare-paying passenger on a regularly scheduled airline; or injury from driving or riding in a speed or organized contest.

Family Fraternal Benefit

The Family Fraternal Benefit provides the following benefits to insured members*:

- a). Pays \$5,000 for the child who is stillborn at least 20 weeks after conception
- b). Pays \$5,000 for the child who dies before the age of 61 days
- c). Offers guaranteed-issue insurance - up to \$10,000 - to any child under age 18.

Orphan Fraternal Benefit

The Orphan Fraternal Benefit provides the following benefit to the children of insured members*:

- a). Pays \$500 monthly allotment for each eligible orphan of up to age 19
- b). Pays up to \$5,000 per year in college scholarships up to a maximum of \$20,000 per eligible orphan

* Insured members, for this and for all fraternal benefits, are defined as those members who have, at minimum, one in-force life insurance policy on the member or spouse with a minimum annual premium of \$300, or permanent life insurance with a face amount of at least \$15,000.

Worthy Grand Knight, Council Officers, fantastic and my brother Knights,

We are living in a very different time than the one our grandparents knew.

Monsignor Thomas Shea has said it well: we are moving from Christendom into a new apostolic age.

For a long time, the Christian faith was supported by the culture around us.

Prayer at the beginning of a school day.

A Friday afternoon community fish fry.

A culture that still knew something of serving God, Christian duty, and moral truth.

But brothers, that world is fading.

If YOU were not grounded in your faith, would today's culture strengthen YOUR virtues? Or would it pull you toward vice and weakened convictions?

Today is not a time for passive Catholics.

It is a time for men on a mission.

Our world has changed.

Our mission as Knights has not.

In a time like this, sacrificial Christian leadership is not optional.

It is essential.

Brothers, we are seeing the symptoms of a culture that has lost hope in Christ.

We see them in broken homes.

in addiction.

in loneliness.

in confused identity.

We see them in children formed more by screens than by their parents.

slow We see them in the cost of babies sacrificed for comfort and convenience.

-THAT is the crisis before us.

So the question becomes: how do we respond?

How do we lead the culture back to hope in Christ?

What is our job, as Knights of Columbus? Pause

We respond !boldly!- by becoming the kind of men this age desperately needs.

Men of prayer.

Men of sacrifice.

Men of courage.

Men of holiness.

Men rooted in the Eucharist.

That is radical leadership.

And that is leadership that shows the face of Christ.

Our Savior, Jesus Christ, did not save the world from a distance.

He took on flesh and dwelt among us.

He healed the broken.

He encountered the sinful and the outcast.

Then He gave His life on the Cross for them, for us.

That is the example of true leadership.

If we are going to live as Christians in this new apostolic age, then we must lead that way too.

Our leadership begins in prayer and confession.

Our fuel comes from adoring and receiving the Eucharist.

Because if we are not being formed by grace, then we will be formed by the world.

And the world that we live in today does not make saints.

It makes passive consumers.

It makes nihilists and hedonists.

It creates weak and lazy cowards.

But Jesus is calling us. circle fingers

I believe that our mission as Knights of Columbus was ordained by the Holy Spirit and given to us through the vision of Blessed Father McGivney for a time like this.

The mission of the Knights is summarized well in James 1:27, which says, "A religion that is pure and undefiled is this. 1. To protect the widows and the orphans and 2. To remain unstained by this world"

Father McGivney understood that Catholic men need support in this mission.

That our families need BOTH eternal AND temporal protection.

He knew that the men of our time need fraternity, formation, and guidance.

*scoff/laugh*The Knights were never meant to be just a social organization.

They were meant to be a tool.

They were meant to be a means of grace.

A brotherhood that helps men live their faith in action.

Our mission is more important now than it was in 1882.

Because now the world is starving.

Starving for purpose.

Starving for truth.

Starving for hope.

Starving for men who will stand up and say, "As for me and my house, we will serve the Lord."

Brothers, that is our calling.

James tells us that Faith without works is dead- Paul Sharpens this message, telling us that Charity is the greatest of all virtues

Catholic men have always been called to be the light of the world.

Jesus tells us how to do it:

Feed the hungry.

Give drink to the thirsty.

Clothe the naked.

Visit the imprisoned.

House the homeless.

Nurse the sick.

Bury the dead.

I talk to our young men nearly every day. If you haven't heard it before, you'll hear it now- These demands of Christ can feel overwhelming, especially to young men who may be suffocating from student loan debt, or embarking on starting a new catholic family.

But Jesus did not tell us to wait to serve until were 65 and retired...

He told us to act now. TODAY!

The Holy Spirit gave Blessed Father Michael McGivney the tools necessary to make this achievable for every man in our parishes.

Food for Families. Coats for Kids. Habitat for Humanity. And our Honor Guards standing for our fallen brothers.

These programs are not just "check marks" toward Star Council.

We are leading our parishes in charity, and building up His body, which is the Church.

So I am grateful.

I am grateful to be here, and grateful to stand among men who are not content with the status quo.

Men who understand the mission: that every Catholic man over 18 **actually needs** to be a Knight.

And that right there gives me hope.

The leadership in this room.

And it should give all of us hope.

We have an opportunity right now to answer this moment well.

If we answer this moment well, it will not just support our families, our parishes, and our communities.

It will benefit the next generation, because they will inherit a witness; they will inherit a legacy of faith.

The same legacy of faith that Father McGivney secured for the immigrant families here in New Haven, Connecticut in 1882.

So let us leave here as men on a mission.

Men of prayer.

Men of the Eucharist.

The men that they call Knights of Columbus at St. Joe's: let us be first in faith, first in charity, and through Him, shining Christ's light, make us first in hope.

Let us be men who lead the culture back to hope in Jesus Christ.

Men who live magnanimously.

Men inspired by Blessed Father McGivney to greater confidence in Christ's love, so that we can continue his work of caring for the needy and the outcast and remaining unstained by this world.

That. is patriotic faith.

That. is charity.

Blessed Michael McGivney, pray for us.

And Our Lady, Queen of the Knights, protect us.

May 2026 Lecture for the Knights of Columbus Chapter 12554 - The Holy Mass explained to Catalina by Jesus and Mary Part 4 of 4

After receiving Holy Communion, when I returned to my seat, while kneeling down, the Lord said: "Listen..." A moment later, I began to hear the prayers of the lady who was seated in front of me and who had just received communion. What she said, without opening her mouth, was more or less like this: "Lord, remember that we are at the end of the month, and I do not have the money to pay the rent, the car payments, nor the children's school. You have to do something to help me... Please, make my husband stop drinking so much. I cannot bear any more his being intoxicated so often, and my youngest son is going to repeat the year again, if you do not help him. He has exams this week... And do not forget our neighbor who must move. Let her do it right away. I cannot stand her anymore, etc., etc."

Then the Archbishop said: "Let us pray," and obviously all the congregation stood up for the final prayer. Jesus said in a sad tone: "Did you take note of her prayer? Not a single time did she tell Me that she loves Me. Not a single time did she thank Me for the gift that I have given her by bringing down My Divinity to her poor humanity, in order to elevate her to Me. Not a single time has she said: thank You, Lord. It has been a litany of requests, and so are almost all of those who come to receive Me."

"I have died for love, and I am risen. For love I await each one of you, and for love I remain with you... But you do not realize that I need your love. Remember that I am the Beggar of Love in this sublime hour for the soul."

Do you all realize that He, Love, is begging for our love, and we do not give it to Him? Moreover, we avoid going to that encounter with the Love of Loves, with the only love who gives of itself in a permanent oblation.

When the celebrant was going to give the blessing, the Holy Virgin said: "Be attentive, take care... You do any old sign instead of the Sign of the Cross. Remember that this blessing could

be the last one that you will receive from hands of a priest. You do not know when, leaving here, if you will die or not. You do not know if you will have the opportunity to receive a blessing from another priest. Those consecrated hands are giving you the blessing in the Name of the Holy Trinity. Therefore, make the Sign of the Cross with respect, as if it was the last one of your life.”

How much we miss in not understanding and not participating every day at the Holy Mass! Why not make an effort to begin the day a half hour earlier and run to the Holy Mass and receive all the blessings that the Lord wants to pour over us? I am aware that, because of their obligations, not everybody can attend daily Mass, but at least two or three times a week. So many avoid Mass on Sundays with the smallest excuse, that they have a child, or two, or ten, and, therefore, they cannot attend Mass. How do people manage when they have other important types of commitments? They take all the children, or take turns and the husband goes at one hour and the wife another, but they carry out their duty to God. We have time to study, to work, to entertain, to rest, but WE DO NOT HAVE TIME, AT LEAST ON SUNDAY, TO GO TO THE HOLY MASS.

Jesus asked me to remain with Him a few minutes more after Mass had finished. He said: “Do not leave in a hurry after Mass is over. Stay a moment in My company and enjoy it, and let Me enjoy yours...” As a child, I had heard someone say that the Lord remained with us for five or ten minutes, after Communion. I asked Him at this moment: “Lord, truly, how much time do You stay with us after Communion?”

I suppose that the Lord must have laughed at my silliness, because He answered: “All the time that you want to have Me with you. If you speak to Me all day long, offering Me some words during your chores, I will listen to you. I am always with you. It is you who leaves Me. You leave the Mass, and the day of obligation ends. You kept the day of the Lord, and it is now finished for you. You do not think that I would like to share your family life with you, at least that day.”

“In your homes, you have a place for everything and a room for each activity: a room to sleep,

another to cook, another to eat, etc. Which place have you made for Me? It should not be a place where you only have an image, which collects dust all the time, but a place where at least five minutes a day the family meets to give thanks for the day and for the gift of life, to ask for their needs of the day, to ask for blessings, protection, health. Everything has a place in your homes, except Me.”

“Men plan their day, their week, their semester, their vacations, etc. They know what day they are going to rest, what day they will go to the movies or to a party, or visit grandmother or the grandchildren, the children, their friends, and to their amusements. How many families say at least once a month: ‘This is the day for our turn to go and visit Jesus in the Tabernacle,’ and the whole family comes to talk to Me? How many sit down in front of Me and have a conversation with Me, telling Me how it has been since the last time, telling Me their problems, the difficulties they have, asking Me about what they need, making Me part of these things? How many times?

“I know everything. I read even the deepest secrets of your hearts and minds. But I enjoy your telling Me about your life, your letting Me participate as a family member, as your most intimate friend. Oh, how many graces does man lose by not giving Me a place in his life!”

When I remained with Him that day and on many other days, He continued to give us teachings. Today I want to share with you this mission that He has entrusted to me. Jesus said: “I wanted to save My creature, because the moment of opening the door to Heaven has been impregnated with too much pain...” “Remember that not even one mother has fed her child with her own flesh. I have gone to that extreme of Love to communicate My merits to all of you.

“The Holy Mass is Myself prolonging My life and My sacrifice on the Cross among you. Without the merits of My life and My Blood, what do you have with which to come before the Father? Nothing, misery and sin... “You should exceed in virtue the angels and archangels, because they do not have the joy of receiving Me as nourishment like you do. They drink a drop from the spring, but you that have the grace of receiving Me, you have the whole ocean to drink.”

The other thing that the Lord spoke about with pain concerned people who encounter Him out of habit, of those who have lost their awe of each encounter with Him. That routine turns some people so lukewarm that they have nothing new to tell Jesus when they receive Him. He also said that there were so many consecrated souls who lose their enthusiasm of falling in love with the Lord, and have made their vocation an occupation, a profession to which nothing more is given, except that which is demanded of one, but without feeling...

Then the Lord spoke to me about the fruits that must come from each Communion that we take. It does happen that there are people who receive the Lord daily but do not change their lives. They spend many hours in prayer and do many works, etc., but their life does not go on transforming, and a life that does not transform cannot bear true fruits for the Lord. The merits we receive in the Eucharist should bear the fruits of conversion in us and fruits of charity toward our brothers and sisters.

We the laity have a very important role in our Church. We do not have the right to be silent, because the Lord has sent us out, as all the baptized, to go forth and announce the Good News. We do not have the right to absorb all this knowledge and not share it with others, and to allow our brothers to die of hunger when we have so much bread in our hands. We cannot watch our Church crumble as we stay comfortable in our parishes and homes, receiving and receiving so much from the Lord: His Word, the homilies of the priests, the pilgrimages, the Mercy of God in the Sacrament of Reconciliation, the marvelous union with the nourishment of Communion, the talks of preachers.

In other words, we are receiving so much and we do not have the courage to leave our comfort zone and go to a jail, to a correctional institution, to speak to the neediest. To go and tell them not to give up, that they were born Catholic and that their Church needs them there, suffering, because their suffering will serve to redeem others, because that sacrifice will gain for them eternal life. We are not capable of going where the terminally ill are in the hospitals, and by praying the Divine Mercy Chaplet, helping them with our prayers during that time of struggle between good and evil to free them from the snares and temptations of the devil. Every dying person has fear, and just taking their hand and talking to them about the love of God and the

marvel that awaits them in Heaven next to Jesus and Mary, next to their departed ones, gives them comfort.

The hour in which we currently live does not allow us to be indifferent. We must be an extension of the hands of our priests and go where they cannot reach. But for this, we need courage. We must receive Jesus, live with Jesus, nourish ourselves with Jesus. We are afraid to commit ourselves a little more, and when the Lord says, "First seek the Kingdom of God, and the rest will be added onto you," He says it all, brothers and sisters. It means to seek the Kingdom of God, by all possible means and with all means, and to open your hands in order to receive EVERYTHING in addition! This is because He is the Master Who pays the best, the only One Who is attentive to your smallest needs.
