have yet to select a shirt color, and that will be discussed at the business meeting. These are a great item to have to wear at all Council activities!

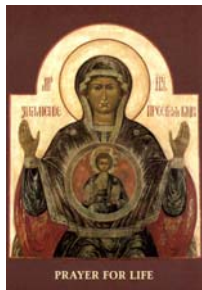

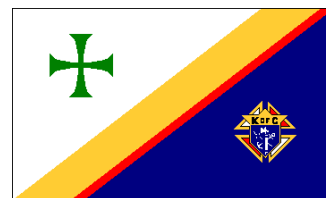
If you have a prospect for membership, forward his information via a prospect card or Form 100 to Membership Director Fred Parsons (467-4755).

St. Teresa of Avila



October 15

Life 1515-1582

Doctor of the Church

Foundress of Discalced Carmelites

Teresa de Ahumada y Cepeda was born in Avila, Spain, in 1515, 27

years after the Muslims were thrown out of Spain, and 30 years after the beginning of the Council of Trent and the death of Martin Luther. She was the third of nine children by the second wife of her father Don Alfonso Sánchez de Cepeda. He was a Jewish convert, hence suspected of not being a genuine Christian. Teresa was very open about her entire life, except for her ancestry.

As a young child she avidly read the Lives of Martyrs, and in an attempt to get to heaven fast at age 7 she and her 11 year old brother Rodrigo ran away from home to be martyred by the Moors in North Africa. After an uncle brought them back they decided to become hermits, as the second best thing after martyrdom. She grew up with a charming personality, and enjoyed dressing up with jewelry and perfume. Her later autobiography was severely critical of these early years of her life. When she was 13 her mother Doña Beatriz died, and her father sent her to a nearby Augustinian Convent to be cared for and educated.

At age 31 she joined the local Carmelite convent with 180 nuns, and lived a comfortable life with her own kitchen, oratory and guest room. The richer nuns had their own servants living with them. She was influenced by a book written by a Franciscan Francisco de Osuna *The Third Spiritual Alphabet* which was influencing a strong contemporary movement in the Church for the reform of convents and monasteries. She had a second conversion to the religious life at age 40, and began emphasizing prayer and meditation. Reading St. Augustine helped her. She began to experience interior visions and voices, and occasionally attained the highest levels of contemplation.

When she proposed to found a convent which would abide by the original strict Carmelite rule, she met with enormous opposition from her fellow nuns, the local bishop, her provincial and the municipal authorities. She and four companions finally founded St. Joseph's in Avila. They lived a life of prayer and penance, and did not wear shoes, so they were called Discalced. The Council of Trent ended in 1563, and four years later the Carmelite Father General allowed Teresa to found 12 new reformed convents for nuns, and 2 reformed houses for friars, The "Calced" tried to prevent the reform, so they kidnapped and imprisoned her ally St. John of the Cross. The discalced survived, and officially became a separate order 9 years after Teresa died.

Teresa wrote several books on spirituality such as *The Way of Perfection*, *The Interior Castle*, and *Thoughts on the Love of God*. She and John of the Cross are recognized as the two outstanding mystics of the Church.

Why Fathers Count

There is a category in social science called 'father absence.' The absence of a father is known to researchers to be a significant factor in the success or failure of children. The fact is, fathers make a huge and irreplaceable difference in the lives of their children in terms of education, income, abuse, mental and physical health, drug use, sexual activity, pregnancy and almost every other social indicator. Here are just a few items from the [National Fatherhood Initiative](#):

Father Factor: Education

Fatherless children are twice as likely to drop out of school.

Father involvement in schools is associated with the higher likelihood of a student getting mostly A's. This was true for fathers in biological parent families, for stepfathers, and for fathers heading single-parent families.

Father Factor: Poverty

Children in father-absent homes are five times more likely to be poor. In 2002, 7.8 percent of children in married-couple families were living in poverty, compared to 38.4 percent of children in female-householder families.

Father Factor: Infants and Early Childhood

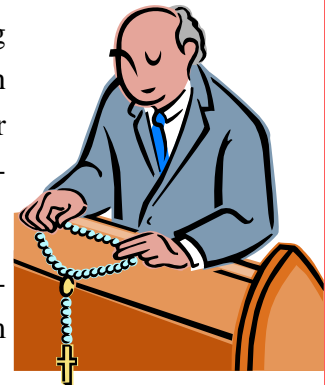

Father Factor: Incarceration

Even after controlling for income, youths in father-absent households still had significantly higher odds of incarceration than those in mother-father families. Youths who never had a father in the household experienced the highest odds.

Father Factor: Drugs and Delinquency

Adolescents, particularly boys, in single-parent families were at higher risk of status, property and person delinquencies. Moreover, students attending schools with a high proportion of children of single parents are also at risk.

Father Factor: Sexual Activity

Being raised by a single mother raises the risk of teen pregnancy, marrying with less than a high school degree, and forming a marriage where both partners have less than a high school degree.

Researchers using a pool from both the U.S. and New Zealand found strong evidence that father absence has an effect on early sexual activity and teenage pregnancy. Teens without fathers were twice as likely to be involved in early sexual activity and seven times more likely to get pregnant as an adolescent

- ✝ When 20 or more ladies are signed up, an institution ceremony is arranged after which they are recognized as a new Auxiliary.
